NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Rhode Islanders,

I am pleased to present our Annual Report for Fiscal Year 2023. Recently, the SMU Data Arts team released data on arts and cultural vibrancy across the 53 states and territories of the United States. We were proud to be named the 11th most vibrant state for arts and culture. As we think about the contributions the arts community makes to the state's quality of life it is important to understand the non-profit arts sector, artists and designers, also are an important part of our state's economy.

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that arts and cultural production accounts for \$2,367,747,000 and 3.25% of the Rhode Island economy, contributing 18,481 jobs. For context, the construction industries are 3.4% of the state's GDP.

RI has a lot to celebrate of in terms of its arts and culture economy and investment from the state is critically important. Our team works diligently to ensure that the state's tax dollars are spent wisely, and our federal funding is distributed in compliance and on time.

Since 2021, our grantmaking to organizations and individual artists totaled more than \$2.8 million and supported nearly 800 arts and culture entities. Fiscal Year 2023 had several standout accomplishments notably the use of National Endowment for the Arts' American Rescue Plan Act funds to launch a workforce development grant program. The Build the Future Grant program strategically aligned the needs of the creative sector with Governor McKee's Rhode Island 2030 Plan and his investments in workforce development.

The following pages provide reports on our statewide arts and culture accomplishments, grant making and programs. But the true work is being done by the state's arts organizations and artists. Our grants assist them in improving our quality of life through celebrating the rich culture of the state. These organizations and individuals make incredible contributions to our health care and education systems, civic life, and forge pathways of economic prosperity for individuals in our communities. We are honored to serve this amazing community of visionaries, problem solvers and caretakers.

Mission

The R.I. Film & TV Office provides comprehensive tools to elevate film, television, and theatrical productions, and film education across the Ocean State, while promoting Rhode Island to a national and international audience.

Film Projects

RISCA developed the Atrium Gallery to recognize talented artists from communities throughout the state. The Atrium hosts multidisciplinary exhibitions in partnership with diverse artists and cultural organizations. The gallery features a stunning tall glass ceiling with light that cascades into an open space surrounded by three walls of artwork. Located on the ground floor of the Administration Building, One Capitol Hill, Providence, this has become a destination point for visitors to the building.

FOLK AND TRADITIONAL ARTS

Folk and Traditional Arts are defined as those artistic practices, which are community or family-based and express that community's aesthetic heritage and tradition.

- Apprenticeships are designed to foster the sharing of traditional (folk) artistic skills between a mentor and an apprentice who is already familiar with the genre. The program creates this opportunity specifically for individuals who share a common cultural heritage.
- Fellowships support individual folk artists who demonstrate the highest level of skill and accomplishment in their craft.

ARTS AND HEALTH PARTNERSHIP

In 2016, the Rhode Island Department of Health partnered with RISCA to support development of the State Arts and Health Plan, a public health roadmap for advancing the integration of arts and health. As part of this process, an interdisciplinary team formed an advisory group to outline a strategy for fully integrating arts and arts-based therapies into healthcare and community settings.

- Hosted the *In Conversation* series, which featured artists, creatives, health professionals, educators, and other innovators, who believe in the power of the arts to engage communities and improve well-being.
- In partnership with the R.I. Department of Health, we participated in a national webinar convened by the National League of Cities and National Assembly of State Arts Agencies. Local and state leaders discussed how artists can collaborate with government to make an impact on health outcomes in our communities.
- RISCA Grantee Rhode Island Philharmonic Orchestra and Music School hosted an in-person panel with opera's renown soprano **Renée Fleming** and other officials. The discussion was inspired by Fleming's work with National Institutes of Health and Kennedy Center, where she developed a program that explores the power of music as it relates to health and the brain.

Cultural Facilities Grant Program provides matching grants, which promote careful planning for capital improvements, preservation, renovations, and new construction for public nonprofit cultural facilities.

Artistic venues, performance centers, museums, arts centers, and cultural spaces located around the state have received \$6 million in grants allocated from the 2021 bond.

Cultural Facilities continued...

The State Cultural Facilities Grant bond initiatives were approved by voters in November 2014 and again in March of 2021. Both ballot measures allotted matching funds for improvements to cultural facilities, which ensure access to arts education and programs for all regardless of a disability. In addition, the initiatives provide funding for jobs to artists and craftsmen in our state. Plan for a new bond has been requested to continue the work.

ARTISTS

Community Engaged Project Grants offer funding of up to \$3,000 for artists or groups of artists to create arts and culture projects that directly and actively engage with R.I. communities. **Make Art Grant** funds of up to \$3,000 for artists or groups of artists to create or continue specific artwork in any discipline.

Artist Open Studio Tours provides support for marketing and administration of artist-initiated open studio tour. The studio tour must consist of multiple artists within one studio building or several nearby buildings and be open to the public.

General Operating Support for Artists program provides grants of \$6,000 for each of three consecutive years (total of \$18,000) for artists to work toward large, specific, and self-identified goals in their art practice.

Accomplishments

- Launched three new grant programs, the result of a 2-year process driven by a working group of Rhode Island artists.
- Working with the R.I. Division of Taxation, updated, and clarified the application process and resources for the Artistic Works Sales Tax Exemption.

The first four recipients of the newly created General Operating Support for Artists were chosen from 140 applications. They were, from top to bottom, Anthony "AM." Andrade, Saberah Malik, Jeffrey Yoo Warren and Evans Molina Fernandez.









ORGANIZATIONS

Project Grants for Organizations provide grants of up to \$3,000 to support arts and culture projects that are relevant and meaningful to Rhode Island communities.

General Operating Support for Organizations sets goals for recruitment of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color organizations and underrepresented cities and towns.

- The newly restructured General Operating Support for Organizations launched. The grant program surpassed its goal of doubling the number of BIPOC-centered organizations by 2025 and added 11 such organizations and two from underrepresented towns, Warren, and Middletown.
- As part of our initiative to assist nonprofits with better accessibility, we co-hosted with Arts Equity and Grantmakers Council of R.I. a workshop on disability rights and federal legislation.
- Partnered with Rhode Island Humanities on Arts and Humanities Month events where we featured four organizations awarded grants through our joint venture RI CHARG. In addition, we recognized former Congressman James Langevin for his dedication to arts and culture.



ARTS EDUCATION

Project Grants in Education support schools, nonprofit organizations, arts educators, and teaching artists. Recipients engage students in rich and meaningful artistic experiences in dedicated learning environments.

- **Big Yellow School Bus** provides funding for schools planning an in-person field trip with an arts and cultural organization or artists.
- Rhode Island Teaching Artist Roster, administered by the National Foundation for the Arts' CreativeGround, is a listing of approved teaching artists.
- For 18 years, we have participated in the Poetry Out Loud Recitation Competition, a national arts education program supported by the NEA and the Poetry Foundation.
- The Arts Education Data Dashboard officially launched and allows users to view arts education data for K-12 public and charter schools.
- Oversaw Career and Technical Education students who built and installed an exhibition of student artworks at the R.I. Home Show.

BUILD THE FUTURE

We received qualified applicants for \$469,096 in funding and were able to provide grants to 14 entities with \$218,000.

We hope funds will become available in subsequent years to offer the grant program regularly.

Build the Future Grants supported existing workforce development programs for arts and culture organizations, culturally specific organizations, or high schools.

With funds from the American Rescue Plan Act, we created the grant program to support already existing arts workforce development programs in the state. Our goal is to prepare residents for employment in the creative sector as part of the recovery from the pandemic.

ARTS AND HEALTH

In 2023, **Project Grants in Healthcare** were updated and renamed, **Arts and Health Grant**.

The revised Arts and Health Grant introduced in FY2024 supports nonclinical art programs with health-related goals that take place in health-based or community spaces. The grant funds both nonclinical arts engagements that promote and facilitate individual health and art activities that address the social determinants of health to provide a community health benefit.

The Arts and Health Grant category is grounded by our recognition that arts and culture contribute to a thriving community. The arts have the capacity to transform the lives of individuals and communities, contributing to health, well-being, and overall resilience. Arts and culture can facilitate the physical, cognitive, and social-emotional aspects of individual healing, and that when applied to public health, promote healthy environments and policies in communities by fostering empathy, awareness, and social cohesion through shared narrative and aesthetic experiences.

FY23/EARLY 24 HIGHLIGHTS

For Arts in the Schools Month in March, art students, arts educators and related stakeholders came together in the halls of the State House to show the strength of the arts in our schools. There were dance and stage performances, poetry, and art exhibits. Additionally, on the floor of the Rhode Island House and Senate resolutions were read simultaneously declaring March Arts in the School Month.

We co-hosted the American Alliance for Theatre and Education upcoming national and first hybrid, conference *Arriba el Telón (Raise the Curtain),* in Providence.

NEA Chair **Maria Rosario Jackson**, spent a day in Rhode Island meeting with leaders of the state's creative community and discussing our evolving arts landscape and arts opportunities.

- Co-hosted by Senator Jack Reed and RISCA, the tour included a roundtable discussion on the intersection of arts and health.
- Senator **Sheldon Whitehouse** joined the conversation, which continued in Woonsocket where they visited artist housing under construction, NeighborWorks and Riverzedge Arts.
- In Pawtucket, Chair Jackson stopped by Mixed Magic Theatre and ended the day at the Providence Arts Club.

ROLE IN THE PANDEMIC

At the height of the pandemic, we developed and implemented rapid response operating grant programs for arts and culture organizations using funding from the Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). In collaboration with local partners, we also created an Artist Relief Fund to help artists who had lost income and cover necessities.

Accomplishments

- Supplied emergency operating support grants to 82 organizations, totaling \$374,800.
- Appropriated additional funds to distribute operating grants to 84 organizations totaling \$678,866.
- Collaborated with the Rhode Island Humanities, for what became a nationally recognized program called RI CHARG.
 - Together we distributed \$968,000 to 121 arts, culture, and humanities organizations.
- Between April 2020, and June 2021, we awarded 1,096 emergency relief grants to artists from the Artist Relief Fund, which totaled more than \$750,000.
